# The Way of Conversion

The very first words uttered by Jesus in his public ministry are a call to conversion. There is a bedrock wisdom here. We are, all of us, unfinished creatures; none of us is yet who we were created to be. In an individualistic, feel-good culture, it is difficult to hear this message; the way of rationalization and self-justification is wide and appealing. Yet, the hard truth of our human story is that, under the conditions of sin and left to our own devices, we humans are inclined to avoid seeing ourselves as the unfinished, imperfect creatures we really are. It is far too easy to avoid the difficult personal transformations that are necessary for our authentic flourishing as God's beloved children.

The scope of God's saving mercy is without limits for those willing to receive it. This is the bold message communicated in the book of Jonah. The prophet was sent, not to the children of Israel, but to the pagan people of Nineveh. He warns them of their imminent punishment. But the Ninevites humbly recognize their need for conversion and repent—and in doing so, they find themselves drawn under the mantle of God's great mercy. The extravagance of God's mercy shocked Jonah and, presumably, the Israelites who would later hear this story.

The question for us is whether we will recognize, as the Ninevites did, that now is the hour of decision, the time of our conversion. St. Paul grasped this urgency, warning that "the world in its present form is passing away." Can we accept that genuine repentance is the way that leads to new life?

**St Francis de Sales** was born in Savoy in north-western Italy in 1567 to a noble family. He studied law at Padua but gave up the legal profession and was ordained priest in 1593. He was made a bishop in 1599 and, by 1602, was Archbishop of Geneva, Switzerland, the home of John Calvin who broke from the Roman Catholic Church in 1530. He founded the Visitation Nuns with St Jane Frances de Chantal and was noted for the great

way he preached, which brought many people back to the Catholic Church following the Reformation. He died at the age of 56 in 1622.

Conversion of St Paul: Paul (also known by his Jewish name Saul) was born in Tarsus in Cilicia in modern-day Turkey. He was a Pharisee which meant that he was well acquainted with both the Law and the Scriptures, which is evident in his writings. He persecuted the early Christians until he was struck down on his way to Damascus to arrest some Christians, an event commemorated on this day. In this incident, the Risen Lord appeared to Paul and from then on Paul became the greatest champion of the faith and is known as the Apostle to the Gentiles. He met with St Peter and the other Apostles in Jerusalem on a number of occasions and undertook three great missionary journeys to spread the faith. Eventually Paul ended up in Rome where, even under house arrest, he spread the faith and wrote some of the letters found in the New Testament. These letters also contain Paul's understanding of who Jesus Christ is and the importance of the death and resurrection of Christ. He was beheaded during the persecutions in the reign of Emperor Nero.



Saints Timothy and Titus: Timothy was a convert of Paul and joined him in his apostolic work. He was with Paul at the founding of the Church in Corinth. During the 15 years he worked with Paul, he became one of his most faithful and trusted friends. He was sent on difficult missions - often in the face of great disturbance in local churches which Paul had founded. He was with Paul in Rome during the

latter's house arrest. At some period Timothy himself was in prison (Hebrews 13:23). Titus was also a close friend and disciple of Paul as well as a fellow missionary. He was Greek, apparently from Antioch. Even though Titus was a Gentile, Paul would not let him be forced to undergo circumcision at Jerusalem. Titus is seen as a peacemaker, administrator, great friend. Paul's "Letter to Titus" addresses him as the administrator of the Christian community on the island of Crete, charged with organizing it, correcting abuses, and appointing presbyter-bishops.
